Living Room:

Furnishability Furniture that should be accommodated in the living area should include the following items (sizes are minimums) for one-bedroom units: One couch, 3'-0" x 6'-10" Two easy chairs, 2'-6" x 314 One television set, 1:-4 One table, 1 4" x 2'-6 For two-bedroom units one easy chair should be added as well as: One dask, 1'-8" x 3'-6 One desk-chair, 1'-6" riving Avea o' diameter not generally as consideration was deviable as by pass traffic but helseptable what not all traffic must pass though 50" for main trafficient not to see door.

Bedroom

All bedrooms should be partition-enclosed. In one- and perhaps two-person dwellings, one wall may be movable wood closets, a baffle wall, or a sliding or folding partition. Sleeping-living room combinations are not recommended, nor are room layouts which require the bed to be in a corner or the side of the bed to be against a wall.

For two or more persons, at least one bedroom should be planned for twin beds. Bedrooms intended for the impaired will require
more floor area than other bedrooms in order
to provide for wheelchair circulation. At least
3 ft (preferably 3 ft-4 in.) must be provided for
a wheelchair along one side of one bed and in
front of clothes closers and forniture.




Fig. 19 Larger-than-standard bedroom may be applicable in larger-than-standard unit or in two-bedroom unrelated occupancy.
