

## CHAPTER V

### CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

#### 5.1 Conclusion

By referring to the analysis in chapter four, the writer found there are 106 words considered as jargons used in Indonesian Police institution. Then, the jargons are classified into three criteria, the jargons related to *Sandi Huruf* (Letter Codes), *Sandi Pangkat Kesatuan* (Corps Position Codes), *Sandi Angka* (Number Codes).

After classifying the jargons, the writer analyzed them semantically. The writer discovered that 11 out of 106 words (10.38%) have denotation meaning and 9 jargons (8.49%) have connotation meanings. Furthermore, there are 86 jargons (81.13%) that cannot be analyzed semantically whether they have denotation or connotation meanings because the jargons are constructed by using the initial of the words, for example *TKP* is taken from *Timor, Kupang, Pati*.

Besides that the writer analyzed them morphologically to see how they are formed. From 106 jargons the writer found that there are 14 jargons (13.21%) with one process, then 4 jargons with two processes (3.77%), and then 88 jargons with no process (83.02%). Thus, It can be concluded that jargons with no process is the most dominant one, and it is followed by jargons with one process, and the least dominant one is jargons with two processes. Jargons with no process are the most dominant one because there so many jargons which consist of numbers and letters and words that cannot be analyzed by using word formation theory.

## 5.2 Suggestion

The writer hopes that the readers will continue the analysis of jargons used in Indonesian Police Institution because the writer assumes that there are many other sides from the jargons used in Indonesian Police Institution that can be analyzed. In this research the writer analyzed about the jargons used in Indonesian Police Institution in general, by referring to this research the writer hopes that there will be the readers who will analyze further about the jargons used in Indonesian Police Institution like jargons used by Special Forces in Indonesian Police Institution.
