

CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

5.1 CONCLUSION

By conducting the analysis in chapter four, the writer discovered there are 114 words considered as jargon from *Kaskus*. The jargon words are classified according to three criteria. The first is jargon words related to user's reputation, second is related to buying and selling activities, and the last one is related to popular utterances. All of the jargon words are classified according to the definition of jargon.

After classifying the jargon words, the writer carried out some analyses related to the semantic meaning. The writer reckoned that there are 65 words with connotation meaning (57.02%) and 49 words with denotation meaning (42.98%) from 114 jargon words. It seems that the jargon words with connotation meaning is a bit larger than the jargon words with denotation meaning.

The writer also learnt about word formation process in *Kaskus* jargon words. From 114 jargon words, The writer found there are 44 (38.60%) with one word formation process, 45 with two processes (39.47%), 15 (13.16%) with three processes, 4 (3.6%) with four processes, 6 (5.26%) with no process. It is obvious that the jargon words with two processes is the biggest and the jargon words with four processes is the smallest. All of the evidence are shown in appendix 4.

The process which frequently occurs is borrowing process because there are 56 (49.12%) jargon words influenced by the processes. The writer made an inference that Indonesian people in *Kaskus* society tends to use English. The statement is based on the evidence that 56 (49.12%) jargon words are borrowing and predominantly English (There are other language but the number is not quite significant). However, They occasionally change the form slightly in order to ease the way to type because perhaps many Indonesian people are not accustomed to using English perfectly. This phenomena can be viewed through the jargon words thread (turn out to be trit), download (turn out to be dongdot), maintenance (turn out to be maintenis, modereator (turn out to be momod), want to ask (turn out to be WTA).

5.2 SUGGESTION

The writer hopes that the reader will go on the analysis related to *Kaskus* jargon. Because the writer assumes there are so many other aspects from the jargon that can be analyzed, for example, finding the reason why the member use jargon or maybe the other researcher can analyze about the usage of emoticon in *Kaskus* because the writer has realized that many *Kaskus* members use emoticon frequently when *posting* in a *thread*. The writer presumes that emoticon is also a linguistic phenomena. Or perhaps, for anyone who likes to do further research about *Kaskus* jargon can get more jargon words, and they can publish a book which deals with *Kaskus* jargon.
