## CHAPTER 5

## CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

## **5.1. Conclusion**

Based on the analysis, the writer concludes that Aya's character is a dynamic character. Starting with Aya's character who is pessimistic, innocent, kind, and gentle, weak, cowardly, naive, and distrustful of herself, then as the chapter progresses, Aya's character becomes different and gets better.
