ABSTRACT

Title: Evolving with Time: Whole Person Education Assessment and Deployment of Digital Technologies in Outcomes-based Teaching and Learning

Summary: In the 21st Century, students must learn to make use of technology with creativity and critique in order to find solutions for global issues. To assist our young people, Whole Person Education (WPE) must evolve with time to include proper and ethical deployment of digital technologies that graduates can exploit to better serve society and benefit humanity. To achieve this, the adoption of outcomes-based teaching and learning (OBTL) will assist the shifting from a teaching-centered to the learning-centered paradigm to engage students in active learning.

Since 2005, OBTL has been enacted at Hong Kong Baptist University (HKBU), and WPE has been operationalized at HKBU into the Graduate Attributes (GAs) as our institutional outcomes.

Using the principles of constructive alignment, we collect evidence on student learning to ascertain that our students are indeed progressing towards the attainment of the GAs while studying at HKBU. Our faculty members continue to adopt and adapt new pedagogies, such as flipped classroom & gamification, and innovative e-learning means, like

MOOCs, SPOCs or virtual reality (VR) and augmented reality (AR). These new pedagogies and e-learning endeavours are innovations and variations in the enactment of OBTL, reinforcing OBTL's constructive alignment and learning-centered concepts.

In this presentation, using the experience of OBTL implementation at HKBU, we will discuss WPE assessment using multiple perspectives with pedagogies, etools and assessment framework in our evidence collection endeavours.

Ridwan Sanjaya

Title: Stimulating Innovation in Education via Library 5.0

Abstract: The adoption of information technology by the current generation demands changes in learning practices at all levels of education, including tertiary education. Assistance is needed in using information technology consistently and has long-term durability to be successfully implemented by all stakeholders. However, not all assistance in the utilization of information technology for education can be successfully widely disseminated. The designated manager often does not has enough interest and ownership to do a campaign in the use of information technology. The library which is often considered minor supporter is actually the effective unit to handle various educational innovations by utilizing information technology. Through innovation, librarian skills are able to be channeled more optimally in education.

Moreover, the student has more chance to interact with the librarian and the library has the potency to enrich the local digital collection. Through those motivation, library can become a driving force in educational innovation. This paper discusses best practices in shifting the paradigm of the role of libraries in the concept of Library 5.0 to encourage innovation in education.

Summary: Rapidly evolving technological innovations in fields such as robotics, artificial intelligence, the Internet of Things, 5G, and among others, disrupt teaching and learning. New and innovative methods and strategies have been introduced in understanding education, classroom organization, classroom management, assessment. pedagogy, ethics, professional development, among others. This keynote paper is aimed at reviewing 4th Industrial Revolution technologies and processes and how this unprecedented technology disrupts education. It also examines the state of creativity and innovativeness in higher education. Further, it presents experiences of the digital transformation initiatives in the whole-person education of Silliman University.

Title: Whole Person Nurturing through U-GATEWAY, the International Collaboration Online Platform

Abstract: In 2018, U-GATEWAY was created and designed as a means for students from developing and underdeveloped countries to gain international exposure though collaboration with students and professionals around the world, across an online platform. The goal of this exposure is to nurture students into becoming global whole persons. U-GATEWAY employs the concept of farming. Under this conceptualization, each member is called 'seed' and when a 'seed' initiates collaboration, the seed becomes a 'farmer' who cultivates the collaboration 'farm', U-GATEWAY has Cultural, four integrated pathways: Academic. Technological and Social (A.C.T.S). The platform operates with the goal of Being connected, Enjoying differences, Sharing talents and Transforming together (B.E.S.T) and encourages the farmers and seeds to Listen first, Appreciate first, Understand first, Give first, and Humor first (L.A.U.G.H). platform encourages innovative The engagement, innovative entertainment and innovative enlightenment (I-E.E.E) and prioritizes the outlook of 'we over I', people over projects, and transformation over transaction.

Title: Ethical Dilemmas: Artificial Intelligence, Neurotechnology, and Higher Education in Asia

Summary: As conversations surrounding the integration of digital technologies into education intensify, two areas — the use of big data, A.I., and machine learning applications in classrooms; and neurotechnology, otherwise known as cognitive enhancement — have sparked widespread ethical debate. This session will review several cases of each, the implications for higher education in Asia, and will question whether existent ethical frameworks are able to provide answers to the many questions surrounding the usage of these technologies. This session concludes with suggestions on a new ethical paradigm that seeks to apply perspectives on whole person education to vexing questions on technology integration in higher education.

Yasuhisa Tamura

Title: Learning Analytics: A Key to Digital Transformation in Education

Abstract: Over the centuries, class activities have been managed and assessed by human teachers. They have monitored students' behavior and activities and given appropriate feedback to encourage students. Over the next decade, however, monitoring and feedback will gradually transition from humans to computers. This forecast is based

on the development of the research area called "Learning Analytics" (LA). LA technology will detect the knowledge failure and misunderstanding of each student, capture cognitive, emotional and even physiological status, and give optimal feedback.

Presently, some educational institutions and private educational vendors have started to utilize LA research results to assist teachers and reduce their workloads. Even if the area lacks expert human teachers, learner will be able to take lessons with optimal and individual feedback to enhance their knowledge and skill. Also, teachers will be able to focus on face-to-face interaction with students. This session will introduce LA research surveys and will overview the possibilities and risks of LA adoption in the classroom.




